Warmly taken up and so properly secure twenty young Americans feel safe and presently live in our city to learn German. They are inspired above all by the warmth of their Karlsruhe host parents who do everything to help the students become closer with German language and culture. In a reception in the city hall, Dr. Schmerbeck and the town council welcomed the guests from Ohio University and its mentor Dr. Ursula Lawson.

It is not least to be owed to administrative councilman Seeberger, that students of Ohio University have found exactly in Germany what corresponds to the images of what their charming mentor, Dr. Ursula Lawson calls, "A typical German city," beautifully, convenient, and not so large that one needs weeks in order to become acquainted with it. That from a fleeting encounter the "Big Love" can be, this is not least a young Americans evidence, Dr. Schmerbeck assisted as an interpreter. The three months in Karlsruhe has taken three years to come to fruition.
